FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT



Today we begin the beautiful season of Advent. It is a season meant for preparation. For what exactly are we preparing? Two things: the celebration of our Savior's birth and the anticipation of His second coming.

These are weighty tasks with eternal consequences. So, let us stewards make the words of the Prophet Isaiah our motto for the season: "Come, let us climb the Lord's mountain to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may instruct us in his ways and we may walk in his paths."

In the weeks leading up to Christmas, it seems everywhere we turn we are pushed to do more to create a "perfect" Christmas day. But the Church's guidance to use these weeks to focus on our spiritual lives can indeed seem like a mountain-climb.

The intentional use of the gift of time is what the Christian steward is called to do, and with even greater intensity during Advent. How can we use our time to prepare for Jesus' birth on Dec. 25 and for His second coming at a date we do not know?

We can push back against the world's pressure to have the "perfect Christmas." Scale back on materialism so we have more time for spiritual preparations: Confession, weekday Mass, adoration, family prayer time, lighting the Advent wreath, acts of kindness.

In the end we will be prepared to celebrate a truly meaningful Christmas, be-come more like our Savior and be ready for Him to come again.

DID YOU KNOW.....

...that the Advent wreath has tremendous symbolism? The wreath is made of various evergreens, signifying continuous life. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent; the purple candles symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and good works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, which is the Sunday of rejoicing, because we the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when our preparation for the coming of our Lord is half over. The light signifies Christ, the light of the world. The Advent wreath truly is a wonderful symbol and reminder of the true meaning of Christmas as we prepare for the arrival of Christ!

THINKING OF STUDENTS IN NEED AT CHRISTMAS

Christmas is a joyous time of year for most, but with families facing financial hardship it can be anything but merry. It's hard to believe that every day, one in five students goes to school hungry and waits in line to receive a breakfast. For lunch some eat pizza scraps from the previous night's supper. During the 2017-2018 school year, in 54 programs, over one million meals were served in our schools to hungry students. A donation of \$13.75 will provide a needy student with a breakfast and nourishing snack daily for a school week.

Other statistics reveal that 80% of classroom learning is done through the eyes, and that one child in four suffers from some kind of vision problem severe enough to impact learning. Many students do not have the financial resources to purchase eye glasses. Several others lack daily essentials such as warm clothing, personal care items, or the financial means to pursue a rewarding education. We often associate poverty with third world countries, little realizing that it exists right here at home in our own backyard.

In his scripture writings about the Lord's judgement of the nations the apostle St. Mathew tells us about the words of Christ when he speaks of feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, giving drink to the thirsty and welcoming the stranger. Christ says, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are my brothers, you did it to me".
